Russian Federation Ushakov Medal

Member Donald Norman Leonard was presented with this medal on Friday 29th August to recognise his involvement in Arctic Convoys during WW II. We are proud of our Arctic Convoys veteran; Don regularly attends our weekly Wednesday Coffee Morning.

It was on 20th August that Don received by hand, a very formal looking envelope, the postman requesting a signature to confirm its safe delivery.

Sent by the 'Embassy of the Russian Federation' it stated: -

"As you may be aware, on the 10th March 2014, President Vladimir Putin signed a decree awarding the Ushakov Medal to the British Veterans of the Arctic Convoys, including yourself. (Donald Norman Leonard).

The letter went on to say: - This summer the Russian Embassy has started a series of presentations in London and other parts of the United Kingdom, You are invited to attend an award ceremony in Trowbridge Wiltshire on 29th August, the presentation being at 14.30 pm.

Don was accompanied by his daughter who drove them to the award ceremony in Trowbridge, the Ushakov Medal was presented to all the recipients by the Russian Ambassador to the U.K. Don has shown us his award, it was enclosed in a beautiful velvet lined case and came with a citation recognising the bravery of the Merchant sailors who provided, under extreme weather conditions, the supplies that Russia needed.

World War 1 Centenary

To commemorate the 100th anniversary of the start of the 'Great War' this U3A laid a floral tribute at the War Memorial in Southwell Gardens.

The tribute comprised a basket of poppies, decoratively arranged by Jean Williams and Fay Burston. That this U3A make a floral tribute to those who had fallen in WWI was suggested by Vour Orchard during a meeting of the Floral Art Group, the poppies were purchased by group members.

On Monday 4th August at 12.15 pm, Chairperson Pearl Price, supported by a group of members, conducted a short ceremony; the floral tribute was laid by member Betty Lambert.

Parking and Obstructing?

There have been problems lately concerning the public's understanding of the laws governing parking; this information may prove to be useful.

In law 'Vehicle obstruction' is covered by a number of acts, on most occasions the Police use the Highways Act 1980. In essence you need to show that a vehicle is causing an obstruction to a member of the public. Quite simply, if a vehicle is parked in such a way that it prevents a person easily walking along the pavement then an obstruction offence applies. This includes entering/exiting a property in a wheelchair, mobility scooter, pushing a pram or using a walking frame/trolley.

An obstruction offence occurs:

If a vehicle is parked partially or wholly on a pavement so that you are unable to freely and easily pass.

If a vehicle is parked in front of a driveway/gate/walkway/drop curb. If a vehicle is parked so that it prevents you freely and easily LEAVING your house/business/land.

However, the offence may NOT apply if a vehicle is parked in such a way that it prevents you from gaining access to your driveway or land.

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All the foregoing information has been taken from the "Senior Siren" a magazine provided by the Senior Citizen Liaison Team of the Avon and Somerset Police.

They confirm that if you are caused such an obstruction you should call your local Police on 101 to request Police attendance. A Police Officer or a PCSO can deal with the problem; they have the option of:

Locating the owner and asking them to remove the vehicle, or: Issuing a fixed penalty ticket to the vehicle or requesting its removal by a tow truck.

Please don't worry about calling the Police for an obstruction, as this is something that can be simply and quickly dealt with.



The Somerset Village Group

With only four fifth Fridays in a year the group used their third on 29th August, to visit Combe Florey. Where's that you might ask.

It is a small village just north of Bishops Lydeard on the A358, the name, apparently means "valley of flowers"; and in spring when the primroses and bluebells are out it becomes a beautiful wooded and floral valley.

Like most small Quantock villages it has a literary connection; in the 19th century a Reverend Sidney Smith (writer and wit) served the parish and in the 20th century the Waugh family set up home in Combe Florey House; the graves of Evelyn Waugh ("Brideshead Revisited") and his wife Laura are behind the church in a private plot. In a grave yard across the road is buried Auberon Waugh the newspaper journalist.

An impressive Elizabethan Gate House lies next to the church, built in local red sandstone and scarcely weathered; it bears the date 1593 which is thought to when it was completed.

The small church is also in rose-red stone similar to the Gate House and inside is a striking memorial, comprising a knight and his two wives; it is of Sir John de Meriet who died in 1300; his first wife, Mary who died when just 18, and his second wife Elizabeth who died in 1334.

It's an interesting village, a bit spread out, its pub the 'Farmers Arms' being half a mile from the village. We visited the small Village Hall where the villages main social events are held and found the local Ladies Sewing Circle busy at their weekly meeting "doing their own thing"; mostly patchwork. The next day (Saturday) they were to hold the Annual Village Show; as is usual we were warmly welcomed, spending some time chatting and explaining who we were and why we were in their village.

A very good lunch was had at the Farmers Arms.

Strollers

The weather over the past months was much kinder to this group; they were able to visit a few new areas, having seen on TV that the Steart Marshes were open to visitors they gave it a try. It was still not completely finished but the group had a good outing, finishing up at Combwich, then back to Cannington for lunch. Another good day was held at Canada Combe and Hutton where you can get great views over Weston to Sand Bay.




The juggernaut bore down at an alarming rate along the one way system, we stood no chance, and the impact was instantaneous.

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
