#### Willows Wetlands Vistors Centre

On Thursday 3rd September, Sue Bloska and I made our way to Stoke St. Gregory to visit the Willows Visitors Centre. This was, in effect, a "taster" day with a view to holding a group visit next year. We had been told that a free cuppa and cake would be offered, so this was an added attraction!

The centre is owned by the Coates family and has been in operation for five generations.

The staff were very friendly and helpful. We were greeted by Ellie, who showed us a DVD of the growing and harvesting of the willows and answered any questions we and the other visitors wished to ask.

There are thirty-five staff who are employed all year round. One of them is a 79 year old lady who still works full-time at basket weaving!

We were given a tour of the barns where willow is stored alongside the drying paddocks. We saw several beautiful, made-to-order coffins, which really were works of art. The company was commissioned to make willow cartridge shells carriers for the film *War Horse*, and they were in the process of making a thousand hampers for Fortnum & Mason's Christmas wares. When filled, the hampers retail at £1,000. Put your order in now!

The tour and accompanying DVD show took roughly forty-five minutes, after which we had our refreshments and looked around the museum and shop. There are also two walks for those who want to stretch their legs.

Sue and I both really enjoyed this visit and plan to do a group tour next year. If you are interested perhaps you could let me know. There is a lovely restaurant and outdoor seating area.

The photography group might find some interest as there is an art gallery with photographs by local photographer, Don Bishop.

In fact there is something for everyone!



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#### **Trip Write-Ups Part 2**

#### The adventures and antics of the usual suspects.

06:15 on Friday September 4th 2015 was a cool but sunny morning as the usual suspects left Highbridge on what is becoming an annual long day out. Armed with two satnavs, one only wanting to remain in Highbridge the other happy to guide us along our way to Tarrant Hinton in Dorset for what is described as the world's largest Steam Fair.

The forty-seventh Great Dorset Steam Fair was in its 3rd of 5 days, the journey was very good we did not encounter any heavy traffic and arrived at 7:45ish in plenty of time before the gates opened at 08:00.

Once in the showground its first things first a welcome coffee over

which the proposals for the day were discussed while studying the programme of events and deciding how to watch two arenas at once! Studying the programme it seemed logical to head for the



Heavy Horse arena as this should have been the 1st to start, unfortunately things did not get off to a good start as there was a 45 minute delay, but this gave us time to look around the stables at these magnificent animals. Having watched the parade we wan-

dered past the static vintage tractors, with 139 specimens plus 10 from overseas, also a special section of Ford and Fordson tractors and a working model tractor section. Then it was on to the Horse ploughing field to see these horses at work before taking in a stroll past and a lingering look at the 36 working Steam Threshing exhibits and 34 working Wood Sawing exhibits before arriving at arena 2 to catch a demonstration by Big Pete and his monster truck display.

We then took a look at some of the in excess of 200 commercial vehicles steam petrol and diesel powered and 118 Military vehicles to spend some time watching the Tractor Pulling competition, before returning to arena 2 for some lunch, a coffee and to watch the parade of vintage and classic motorcycles.

Fully refreshed and raring to go it was time to head for arena 1 the Heavy Haulage Arena which for me was where the stars of the fair could be found, the steam traction engines. Taking the weight off our feet it was very pleasant sitting in the afternoon sun watching these fantastic vehicles parade past, 131 Road Haulage Locomotives and 12 Steam Lorries and Buses all strutting their power

dressed in all their finery, paintwork highly polished to say nothing about the brass and copper. Accompanying these splendid specimens were 83 fully working miniatures, exact in every detail providing a passenger



ferry service from one end of the arena to the other. The tribute to

the 1st World War was a fine display with the mounted division reenacting a field battle complete with cavalry charges. Also on display and working were a World War 1 Tank a MK II 18 pounder field gun, a Royal Artillery field gun, water bowsers, ambulances and various wagons and carts. The military section was enhanced by a Centurion tank which was to play quite a different role later in the afternoon.

Taking a break from the arena it was time to watch some steam ploughing. All day it had been possible to hear steam whistles being sounded in what appeared to be a form of signalling and that is exactly what it was, as we approached the ploughing field all became clear, a steam tractor situated at each end of a field with a steel cable running between them, fastened to a plough. As the whistles were sounded one tractor would pull the cable and plough with the ploughman across the field while the other tractor would control the speed at which it travelled. When the plough reached the edge of the field whistles would be sounded first to stop the cable then to let the opposite side know the plough was being uncoupled, turned around and re-coupled, another sequence of whistles would say that the tractor was moving to create the next furrow then a whistle to say all is well pull it back. Quite a sight and very interesting to watch.

Back to the arena to see some real power at work. It had not gone un-noticed that a steam railway locomotive had been sat at the far side of the arena on a transporting trailer, this locomotive was moved towards the centre of the arena and joined by a very large boiler also on a transport trailer, this boiler we understand weighs in at 150 tons, the two trailers were coupled together then two road locomotives one front and one rear were coupled, and what ensued was a clear demonstration of the power of steam as these two road locomotives moved the railway locomotive and boiler

around the arena which was anything but flat if that was not enough the Centurion Tank was then coupled in and this too was pulled around arena up hill and down dale, a combined moving mass of over 300 tons controlled by the power of steam.

The sun is setting and the light is fading time for a spot of supper before the grand illuminated show begins, the finale of our day. Fully refreshed once again its back on your feet to walk around and marvel at the illuminated showman's steam engines all running and providing power for the fun fair which is in full swing, before moving on to admire and listen to the music of some 37 steam fairground organs with their distinctive tunes, before having one final coffee to reflect on a twelve and half hour day having fun but to discover you have it all to do again next year because you only saw about half of the show, arriving back in Highbridge about 11:15pm. We should have slept well that night, however our minds were still buzzing with all we had seen during our great day out!








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#### **Away Days**


