You may remember that back in 2014 we sponsored the printing and publication of a booklet "In Memory of the Men of Huntspill who fell in the Great War"; the occasion being the 100th anniversary of its commencement. The profit from the sale of the booklet to be donated to the above charity, it proved to be a success. The resulting profit of £125.00 was sent to the charity by member Roger Ouston who had researched the lives and families of the 30 men.

Roger received a letter from the charity thanking us for the donation; in it they quoted the benefits received by an Afghanistan Veteran Alex Ford who, following his injury, received support provided by the use of cash donated by the public, he has now taken his first steps on recovery.

Local News

If you are interested in the ancient history of this area you may wish to know that facilities at the Avalon Marshes Visitor Centre (the old Peat Moors Centre) at Shapwick are being greatly enhanced.

History is being recreated with the construction of two replica buildings; an Anglo-Saxon long hall and a Romano-British house. The long hall will be made entirely of timber and is based on information found at Cheddar. The Roman house is to be constructed partly out of Otterton sandstone found when making the Cannington Bypass, and will feature a typical hypercaust and heating system.

When completed, later this year, the Anglo-Saxon long hall and Romano-British replica building will provide an important educational and visitor resource at the Centre.

Member Contributions

Major Tom to ground control

At 07:45 on October 13th 2015, a blue Citroen C4 launched from junction 22 Highbridge on the M5 bound for the moon, (Alice.) well the National Space Centre actually, at the controls was Major Tom with Princess Leia as co-pilot. Breaking away from moon base alpha I set the co-ordinates for earth and in particular Highbridge whilst Leia finished securing things and



herself, then it was or should have been full speed ahead, however due to solar activity the early part of our journey orbiting Leicester was at reduced speed. Then upon hitting a solar storm pro-



gress was almost at a stop for about an hour whilst we navigated our way around route M42 before being given clearance to proceed at full speed. Touch down at junction 22 was some 12 hours after departure, it's great to see home sweet home. Highbridge you are a wonderful sight.

If you have not already visited this local industry you will be able to learn about the history and art of willow growing and basket making. There is a shop, gallery and Video room where you can view a 40 minute film and then go on a guided tour of the site.

On 21st April is the visit to RHS Garden Rosemoor near Torrington in Devon the attraction is surrounded by woodland and is rich in variety throughout every season, featuring displays of formal and informal planting enhanced by the beautiful North Devon landscape. Highlights include two stunning rose gardens, cottage garden, a stream and rock gully, a fruit and vegetable gardens, woodland walks and an arboretum.
