# Member Contributions Part 1

#### Somerset Churches 3

Our proposed day for our last church visit did not materialise owing to bad weather. So we made a date for January 13th (could be unlucky for us), but it turned out ok cold, dry and sunny.

We made our way to St. Michael's church Brent Knoll, a lovely position on the side of the knoll with a well tended churchyard. The building dates from the 11th century; the remains of a Norman Church are incorporated in the fabric of the present building. The dedication to St. Michael is also a relic of the Norman's since it was a favourite name for churches in Normandy at the time of the Conquest. There are several things of interest, the large memorial to John Somerset and less prominent is the coat of arms over the vestry door that dates from the time of Charles 2nd, who after the reformation enacted a law that all churches should display the royal insignia. There's a peal of 6 bells dating from medieval times, the last one installed in 1817.

This church contains several 15th century Bench Ends which are well worth looking at. One indicates a fox in Bishop's clothing which indicates the disrespect of the people of South Brent (as Brent Knoll was then called) for the Abbot of Glastonbury, under whose jurisdiction this church came, who was trying to lay his hands on the tithes of this wealthy parish. Another shows the completion of the vengeance. Here the fox has been hanged by the geese and the watchdogs bark in triumph. Certainly a church worth a visit.

East Brent was our next stop. St. Mary's church dates from around 1300; the tower and spire were added about a century later. There was certainly an earlier church because a rector was recorded in 1190. Of that church nothing remains. Abbot John Selwood was vicar from 1467-1493 and built himself a manor house adjacent to the

church (demolished in 1708). He also brought from Glastonbury most of the pews. These bear his initials and are rich in fine carvings. During the reign of Charles 1st the pulpit was acquired and the following year a gallery. The fine lath and plaster ceiling of the nave decorated with a blackberry thorn motif, added in 1637 by Italian craftsmen. On the exterior of the tower are three niches; the upper one contains an effigy of King Ina with a sceptre and mound embracing a monk. The middle niche is Queen Frithegrand and in the lowest, her husband King Ethelard who succeeded Ina. During the 19th century extensive restoration was carried out.

Next on to Lympsham. The earliest reference of a religious building on the site was 1235. in that year the Abbot of Glastonbury made a survey of all the Abbey Estates. The earliest reference to a Rector of Lympsham was not until 40 years later on 24th September 1274 when King Edward 1st appointed Bartholomew de England rector.

There is no record when the present church was built, but was thought to be around 1400AD. The St. Christopher peal of bells originally consisted of 5 bells until 1864. Four of the bells were dated 1696, 1734, 1794, and 1825. The 5th was undated. These 5 were recast by George Mears and Co. of Whitechapel in 1864. A sixth bell, the treble was added in 1878. The tower is over 2 feet out of perpendicular and has been for centuries. The clock dated 1849 was made by Thomas Hale and Co. of Bristol. In May 1991 it was motorised.

If you leave the churchyard by the SE corner there's a kissing gate, one of the few left in the county.

We then made our way to Ollies for lunch.

We have enjoyed several good ambles during the autumn and winter.

Unable to find a vaguely remembered footpath at Burtle we walked from the church through Robins Lane and back along Mark Road. There being no nearby café we went to the White Horse but the food was considered to be a bit pricey so a return visit is unlikely.

At Brean Down some of us stayed on the flat land and some tackled the hill. Those who went up, took the road gaining shelter from the brisk wind, and reached the fort, where I felt that the proclaimed range of the gun on one emplacement put Cardiff at great risk! The returning party split into two, some returning by the road and some down the steps. The three groups re-assembled for lunch at Brean Down Café.

A tree lined section of the Cheddar railway track back to the reservoir was delightful with the leaves displaying their autumnal glory. It was Remembrance Day and we held our own silence standing together on the track. Cheddar Garden Centre had our patronage for lunch.

Early in December, with our Christmas dinner at the "Pimp" firmly in our minds, we walked around West Huntspill, as reported in the last magazine. Faye and others in the group pointed out various local features and related stories and memories of the village. We were a little early arriving at the pub but sat and chatted until the restaurant was ready and then enjoyed our meal with much friendly laughter.

The day before Christmas Eve, a damp and misty day as I recall, saw us walking from the Apex Park along the river bank and sea front to stop for coffee at Reeds Arms, time passed and some of us stayed for lunch. We returned to Apex via Marine Drive.

As our "church crawl" had been abandoned on the Friday before New Year due to icy paths we took the opportunity to re-instate it in place of our 1<sup>st</sup> walk of the year. As there was a very cold wind howling the

warmth of the churches was welcome. The lunch venue was "Ollies" where we were made very welcome.

January saw us walking around Cheddar Reservoir, chosen as the day was damp and we needed a firm footing. We were amazed, and relieved, to see how the level had risen since our last visit. It still has a way to go before it is full and water was pouring in at a steady stream. We started on the windy side, where there were waves lapping the steps, and enjoyed the calm when we came into the lee. The only wildlife of note was a cormorant sitting on a breakwater. A short drive took us to Cheddar Garden Centre for lunch.

The 1<sup>st</sup> walk of February was cold and misty. It was decided that the Strawberry Line from Axbridge to Winscombe would shelter us from a biting wind. Most of the party walked to the town and found a café for refreshment before returning to the car park. A few returned after about 2 thirds of the walk and came back towards home for lunch and a "warm".
