## **Member Contributions Part 1**

#### Our visit to Athelhampton House

#### And what an enjoyable day it was.

Our day out, on Thursday 20<sup>th</sup> July dawned a lovely warm, dry day and everyone was looking forward to a grand day out; were not disappointed, our journey into Dorset was uneventful, being the usual pleasant jovial run.

Upon arriving at Athelhampton House we were greeted by the very pleasant staff who gave us a plan of the area plus a short history of the house and told us about the various facilitates that were available, these included a restaurant where there was waitress service; we took advantage of this, obtaining and enjoying a very good reasonably priced meal, in comfortable surroundings.

Once suitably fed we set off to tour the house and gardens; the house was built about 1485 and, in one way or another, it has had to survive much during its 500 years of history. The restoration of the house began in 1891, with the north-east tower being added in 1895, the north wing followed in 1920/1. The beautiful formal gardens were designed by Inigo Thomas.

The house was purchased by the grandfather of the current owners, (the Cooke family) who moved there from Bristol in 1957. When grandfather purchased the property, it was in a rather derelict state, however, over the years much restoration has taken place and today, we were able to see the results of their hard work.

There is a friendly feel about the house, it has that 'lived in' atmosphere, not often found in 'stately homes' we were particularly lucky today because it appeared that we were the only coach party present, this gave us the opportunity, and space, to spend time looking at the home and its furnishings. Thank you Vour and Carole for finding such an interesting place to visit, it was a great day out. C.F.B.

Lynton & Lynmouth - 22<sup>nd</sup> June.

Thursday started off a much cooler day than it had been at the start of the week when we had all been sweltering in temperatures of 30 - 34 deg. C.

The weather stayed warm and pleasant for us throughout the day, allowing some of us to sit outside and indulge ourselves to a cream tea before returning to the coach at half past four.





## Member Contributions Part 2

#### Somerset Churches 6

Our first visit today was to the little church of St. Andrew at Compton Bishop. The church was dedicated by Bishop Jocelin on 13th July 1236. The south doorway and the font were made for a church at least a century older, evidence of more than 800 years of worship in this beautiful peaceful place. The church has a 14th or 15th century pulpit with tracery panels, carved friezes said to be "one of the best in Somerset". The tower is of the Perpendicular style and dates from the 15th century. An external stair turret gives access to the bell ringing chamber which contains 6 bells, 4 of which were cast by the Bilbie family the famous bell-founders of Chew Stoke. In the centre of the nave is the Churchwarden's Oak Chest which at one time contained a slot into which money for the poor could be dropped. A walk around the churchyard you'll find 2 chest tombs date unknown, also an ancient cross. Enjoy the peace and tranguillity to be found in this church, not a car to be heard just the singing of the birds. If you plan a visit parking is a bit restricted.

On we go to our next port of call. The village of Loxton is referred in the Domesday Book as Lochstone, which suggests a Saxon origin. The church is also dedicated to St. Andrew, it was built on an old Saxon foundation. The first authentic date is from the list of Rectos (to be found on the West wall of the nave) which is complete as from 1297. On entering the porch a fine specimen of an ancient hagioscope (or squint) through this the sexton had a direct view of the altar, enabling him to see the celebrating priest elevating the host at the mass (or holy communion) and thus ring the Sacricing bell. The church has a peal of 6 bells 2 of which are pre Reformation, they are rung from the porch and are regularly used. The oak panel work and carvings in the church are exquisite, well worth a visit, but parking can be a bit of a problem.

Our last visit was to the church of <u>St.Peter@St.Paul</u> at Bleadon. There is good reason to believe that there was a church on this site in Saxon times, although nothing remains except perhaps the little stone angel in the arch on the north wall. The dedication to <u>St.Peter@St.Paul</u> was quite common in those days as the 2 saints shared the same feast day. The tower, which has been dated to around 1390, contains 5 bells dating from 1711 and were made by Edward Bilbie of Chew Stoke and 1 from 1925 by the Whitechapel Bell foundry London. The 80ft tower has 3 chambers: the ringing chamber, clock chamber and the belfry. The clock was installed as a result of public subscription to commemorate the Diamond Jubilee of Queen Victoria. The copper convex dial is 7ft in diameter and is placed approximately 70ft above the ground, another fine building. After all of this if you wish to purchase a sandwich or a light lunch, try the Bleadon farm shop and cafe great value for money.......

#### Strollers Summer

23 June and the solstice is past! Denise had planned a West Huntspill stroll starting at the church car park. We set off down Church Road, turned into Sloway Lane and then walked along the "cut" to the outfall. It was a bright blowy day and I for one was glad to be in the sea air (no pollen). The sluice gate on the seaward end provided a crossing and we returned on the south side of the channel to Sloway Lane Bridge. Strolled up past Laburnum House and found the footpath across the field, which fortunately had been cut, back to the cars just in time as other cars were coming in presumably for a church function. I was unable to go for lunch at Denise's home but am told she provided a royal feast and her garden is a joy to see.

The second stroll in June was an unknown to all of us doing it! We had rejected any that needed travel on the A38 so set off for Wedmore. The ten of us there knew none of the footpaths so having parked at the village hall we walked up a road, with some beautiful houses, towards the church, hoping there would be, as there often is, a church path but there wasn't. We returned to where there was a footpath sign pointing up a hill. There was a worn path across the field so we bravely set off to explore. It led to a very wonky bridge leading to a high and dilapidated stile, which some of us (well me) found difficult. This led to a very pleasant amble through a wooded track to another very steep stile, which I negotiated somewhat inelegantly, leading to another worn path back down the hill to the gate where we started. Despite the stiles it was an enjoyable stroll and my thanks to the group for their help and patience. We returned to Riches for lunch.

June was coming to an end and the weather uncertain when we travelled the short distance to Downend (Puriton not Bristol!) and

parked along the road. A short way further on there was a footpath, but the stile had been removed and a temporary gate tied across which was skilfully removed (and replaced) to gain access. The way marker indicated the path into a field that had been planted and the margins left overgrown with thistles and other weeds. We walked up the opposite side of the hedge but on reaching the top the footpath route was not clear, so we retreated. At this point I left the group. On my return down the road I spoke to a lady cutting her grass who informed me that the path should go across the top of the hill and re-join the road but the farmer did all he could to discourage people from using it. When the main group returned having walked around the village we all crossed the motorway on the foot bridge and had lunch at the Puriton Inn.

I was unable to join the group for the first stroll in July but am told they went to Shapwick Nature Reserve at Ham Wall so here is a photo supplied by Audrey. Lunch was taken at Sweets.



There was no stroll on the last Friday of August as most of the group went on the boat trip.

#### <u>Cirencester Park – The Bathurst Estate</u> £7.00 <u>September</u>

Cirencester Park is the home of the Earl and Countess Bathurst. There are extensive grounds and walks. The town of Cirencester is only <sup>3</sup>/<sub>4</sub> mile from the house at the top of the Broad Avenue. Cirencester was the second largest town in Britain during Roman times.

The market square is dominated by the parish church of St. John the Baptist, which is almost cathedral-like, and the square itself is mentioned in the Domesday Book.

There are no catering facilities in the park, so you will need to take either a packed lunch or walk in to town for refreshments.

Batsford Arboretum	£13.50	<u>October</u>
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The arboretum is situated near Moreton-in-the-Marsh, Gloucestershire. It was created by Lord Redesdale in the 1800s. He was the grandfather of the infamous Mitford sisters and the arboretum covers fifty-six acres. It has been featured on BBC's Gardeners World and Countryfile.

There is a garden terrace café serving hot and cold food plus a garden and gift shop to peruse if you wish to take home a memento or plant.
