Member Contributions Part 1

Liverpool Holiday 2018

The Holiday Group have arranged for us to holiday in Liverpool early in 2018, this holiday, to be taken in April will obviously be somewhat different to those we have enjoyed in the past because we are not going to a seaside resort.

For those of you have not previously visited this thriving, cosmopolitan and vibrant city you may wish, during your 4-day break, to see as much of it as you can, there is certainly a lot to see. Unfortunately, you have only a few days to fit everything in, Diane therefore felt that you may be interested in receiving a few brief details on the attractions that this great city has to offer.

We are staying at The Mercure Tower Hotel which is on Chapel Street and close to The Three Graces, these are the buildings that dominate the river frontage and are topped by the Liver Birds. The hotel is a few minutes walk away from the river, and is on the "City centre circular bus route". During your stay, you will be able to discover more about this area close to the River Mersey and to take advantage of all the museums and many of the landmarks that make Liverpool famous and a very interesting city to visit.

The nearest bus-stop on the circular route is close to the hotel; it operates a 'Hop-on-hop-off' service and your initial payment will last all day. The route takes you past most of the city's major attractions, the Metropolitan and Liverpool Cathedrals, Chinese Arch, Albert Docks and Museums Area, Mersey Ferries and Beatles Story, Western Approaches, Cavern Club, World Museum, Walker Art Gallery, St Georges Hall, Lime Street Station.

These are well worth a visit and could, easily, occupy a lot of your time; the following gives just a brief description of each attraction:

Metropolitan Cathedral

Affectionally called 'Paddy's Wigwam by Liverpudlians. It is vast, the high altar and sanctuary are accessible to the entire congregation of 2,300, the masterful use of stained glass in the lofty corona gives the main body of the cathedral a mystical dark atmosphere. It is a Roman Catholic Cathedral.

Liverpool Cathedral

This is one of the finest and largest Anglican cathedrals in the world. It dominates the city, amongst many awesome views the finest is probably that from the Nave Bridge, it is the soaring nave and chancel. The east window, which depicts the Tree of Life is so large that the entire Lady Chapel would fit through it.

Chinese Arch

Regrettably only the arch remains, signs of the Chinese culture have gone.

Albert Docks

Hundreds of workers once toiled at these docks, they were originally designed to accept sailing ships but were superseded by larger steamships, and in 1972 the docks were closed due to lack of use; the site was to be cleared but following the opening of the Merseyside Maritime Museum in 1980 it was decided to redevelop the whole area. The museums, could, if you like these places, keep you happy the whole holiday.

Across the road from the Albert Docks is the Museum of Liverpool, and the Pier Head from which the Mersey Ferries sail. Also, here you will see the buildings which dominate this area, they include the Royal Liver Building on top of which are the famous Liver Birds.

Moving on, and close to our hotel, (just off Chapel St.) is the museum called Western Approaches, this very interesting building was so secret during the WWII and after, that until the mid-1900s even the people of Liverpool did not know of its existence. So strongly was the bunker constructed that it was impossible to demolish it economically, so in the 1970s it was decided to retain the 'history' and produce a museum; during the war 400 military personnel lived and worked in this underground 'bunker' to ensure the ALLIED convoys were protected and we were supplied with food and the Russians with armaments and other essential goods in their fight against the German forces.

From here the tour takes you to the World Museum of Liverpool, Walker Art Gallery, and St George's Hall, all are well worth visiting, it is not possible to describe their attractions in just a few words, across from the hall is Lime Street Station, this is no ordinary station, go there and see for yourself.

These notes just scratch the surface of Liverpool, you would need to be there a very long time to see just a portion of this great city, there is still Liverpool One for shops, Anfield/Goodison for football, it goes on and on.




