'Thank you Vour ' from all of us for yet another great day out!




An unusual place to visit to say the least, not one of our regular *haunts*, but interesting none the less.




trying to 'come over from the other side' It was such a relief when I was confronted by our second group, who by this time, had caught up with us.



Somerset Churches 11

Our visit started on Friday at All Saints Church Otterhampton overlooking the river Parret. Many years ago Christians built and set apart this place for prayer. They made their church beautiful with their skill and craftmanship. Here they have met for worship, for children to be baptised, for couples to be married and for the dead to be brought for burial. Although services are no longer regularly held here, this church remains consecrated. It's one of the 291 churches throughout England cared for by The Churches Conservation Trust. A church was established on the site in the 12th century although the current building dates from the 14th century. The perpendicular west tower was added later, it has a peal of 4 bells dating from the medieval period. The interior includes a Norman font with a Jacobean cover, and a screen from the 16th century. The original dedication was to Saint Peter, however it was later renamed All Saints.

The former church at Stockland Bristol was dedicated to All Saints in 1316. The parish church was probably a mother church as suggested by the claim in 1377 that people from Otterhampton and the Marsh



should normally be buried in Stockland churchyard and the vicar was entitled to all offerings for requiems. In 1865 Thomas Daniel, lay rector and patron rebuilt the present church at his own expense. The new church on the site of the old was dedicated to Saint Mary Magdalene. It was built of lias stone in the early 14th century style and comprises a chancel with south transept, a nave with north aisle and south porch and a west tower, which contains a peal of 5 bells, only one of is dated 1827 and predates the rebuilding of the church. Many fragments of the old church were used in the building of the new church.

The Church of Saint Andrew in Stogursey was built as a Benedictine priory church around 1117 by William de Falise who came over from Normandy with William the Conqueror; he was rewarded with several Somerset estates including one called Stoche (was Stoke Courcy now Stogursey). The church was enlarged around 1180 when the apses were demolished and the chancel extended. The priory was dissolved around 1440 and it became a parish church. It was further altered in the 15th century, more restoration and rebuilding was done during the 19th century. The church contains 2 Norman fonts one being brought from the redundant church of Saint Andrew at Lilstock. At floor level in the South porch is a Sanctuary Ring installed in the 13th century. In Medieval England criminals could find a Place of Refuge in a church for up to forty days and then admit their crime or stand trial. (Good job that doesn't apply anymore). A magnificent building well worth a visit.

Our lunch stop this time was at the Quantock Gateway, highly recommended.

Strollers Late Summer/Autumn

Most of our group were in Bournmouth, or otherwise occupied, so five of us set off for Pawlett. It's a longish track down to the site of the old pub, opposite Combwich, with several gates. Mary did a sterling job and I promised her an Easter Egg! Our windcheaters were pressed into service and we set off along the Parrett



bank. The tide was in and two jet skiers entertained us doing showy turns and the like, however they wisely gave way when the sand dredger, Arco Dart, rounded the bend. We had been watching her progress from Dunball as the meanders had made it look as though she was sailing in a field with the cows! Very black clouds around us appeared to be heading in our direction so we made our way back to the cars. By the time we arrived at Riches for coffee it was early lunch time, the rain arrived two hours later.

The weather was holding dry, but coats were needed, when we set off for the Avalon Marshes Centre to park for our stroll along the South Drain through Shapwick Heath Nature Reserve for our second outing in September. A lone young swan, still in his brown feathers, which I have learned they keep for about 6 months before turning white, was cautiously descending the bank to the water where he took off very strongly. He was swimming faster than we were walking! A grey heron rose just in front of us and flew along low to the water, I guess we had disturbed his fishing. The sun came out to play during our return journey and we detoured around a boarded track along a lake, but there was no wild life in



evidence. All except four of us went to Sweets for lunch "al fresco". Much ribald hilarity was caused by Brenda who declared "I'm looking between that man's legs to see what I want in my bap"! (Perhaps I should explain the menu boards are below the counter). Further laughter broke out when Fay said she knew she had put on a pound

while on holiday and that her chair had broken. What lovely company you all are.

The 1st two weeks of October had been warm and mainly sunny, an Indian Summer perhaps but Storm Callum arrived over Thursday night and Friday morning was, like the baby in the night, wet and windy. Seven of us bravely gathered in the car park and much less bravely decided that walking was not an option as not only was it pouring with rain, the gusts of wind were very strong. So a pleasant couple of hours were spent at Ollies sharing anecdotes of working life over breakfast and coffee.

The convoy set off to Morrison's car park for a walk along the canal where there was some shelter from the cold wind. The canal was fairly full and the path strewn with wet leaves. As we walked toward the YMCA we saw a heron come in to land and several moorhen but little else and encountered relatively few other people using the path as we made our way to the docks. The high walls, carved beams and bridges make this section an interesting walk. We cut back through the "brewery" field (now a playing field), Angel Place, the Arcade and the Corn Market to St Mary's Church where we diverted to look around this very old building, and so back to the cars. There was some confusion about the lunch venue so we inadvertently split up.




