Strollers—Early Autumn

Well it's autumn again, how the years slip by. It was a beautiful balmy day following overnight rain and we headed for Wayacre Drove, parked by the sewerage works, we go to all the best places, and set off along the Cycle Route 33. I know that doesn't have guite the impact of Route 66 but this is Somerset not the USA! The track led us through fields of maze, which we observed was taller than some of our more petite walkers, with its husks filling out for harvest. It is guite a short walk, just under 2 miles return, to Diamond Farm caravan park, which was full but with very few people about. Although the tide was ebbing there was still enough water in the channel to enhance the view and Weston, Uphill and Brean were all crystal clear. The channel up-stream of the sluice was full, holding the water for agricultural use and to keep ground water levels stable. The two sluices, Brean Cross and Bleadon, enable guite sophisticated management of different levels and reduce salt water ingress. We took lunch at The Hobbs Boat where we were made very welcome.

Unfortunately (for me) due to inclement weather and other commitments this is the only stroll I have managed this time. Paula.

Away Day Report—Bennetts Water Gardens

Following on from all the rain we had on the Tuesday & Wednesday, I was beginning to wonder why we were bothering to go all the way down to Weymouth the following day, just to visit Bennetts Water Gardens, when all I needed to do was to sit in the conservatory and look out of the window at all in the water in our garden!

However, the following day, the early morning sun was full of eastern promise and by the end of our day, the only rain we experienced, came hammering against the coach windows during our return journey. How Vour gets to organise such favourable weather for our 'Away Days' is way beyond me!

Bennetts Water Gardens houses a national plant collection of water lilies which are scattered across six ponds. On our arrival there, we were starting to wonder if we would even get to see any of them, as our welcoming statement from their receptionist was "We were expecting you yesterday!" They had laid on extra staff and food for the restaurant, both of which had been reduced on the day we arrived, as we were obviously not expected.

Thankfully it all turned out right in the end, it was their mistake, so they brought in extra staff to cater for us, and so we began our visit.

The ponds cover an area of eight acres with a Monet style Japanese bridge as the centrepiece and with over 140 different varieties of lilies, there are, in the middle of summer, tens-of-thousands of flowers. The bridge was commissioned here in 1999 to commemorate 100 years since Monet's painting 'Water Lilly Pond 1899'

Many of the original water lilies planted here by the Bennett family in 1959 came from the same nursery in France that supplied Monet's garden in Giveny. We ambled around each pond prior to having lunch, which, despite their stated earlier problems, was exceptionally tasty and quick to exit the kitchen.

Feeling a bit 'stuffed' (like the heron – which I nicknamed Gordon by the way (Gordon Bennett?? oh never mind!!)

After lunch we then embarked upon a second trip round the ponds in the warm sunshine. Then into the museum to learn about the history of the site from the Brickwork & Clay pits of 1859 right through to the gardens of today.

Those that went enjoyed a lovely relaxing day, it was different, it was unusual but none the less' an interesting day out. "Thank you Vour for arranging the trip". It was then time to say our 'Goodbye's 'so from all of us \ldots

Somerset Churches 15

Too many motorists travelling along the A38 between Shute Shelve and East Brent it must appear that Biddisham is an over-sized nameplate for a cluster of swiftly passed houses. It would not occur to them (as it did with our group) that it is a village with a very long history of many hundreds of years. To find the church of St. John the Baptist it is necessary to turn left into Biddisham Lane (which is a dead end road) to glimpse at among a cluster of trees, a churchyard scene repeated hundreds of times throughout our country, the ancient church, the churchyard cross and the giant yew tree. The church has stood on the present site for nearly 800 years. The tower has a peal of 4 bells, all over 300 years old, and for some reason the lower half of the tower is leaning but the top half which has been restored, is vertical. Much restoration has been done inside and outside the building in Victorian times. The church has a Norman font, a carved Jacobean pulpit somewhat similar to that at Weare, and on one wall is a scratch dial, survival of time keeping before there were clocks. Well worth a visit to the church know one knew was there.

A few miles up the road from Biddisham is the church of St. Gregory in Weare, it's one of 6 churches which comprise the Parish of Crook Peak. The present church was built in the Perpendicular style at the time Henry VII was king, but there would have been previous buildings on the site. It has a fine 15th century tower with pinnacles and parapet, the belfry contains 6 fine-toned bells. The splendid front door with 1755 on its latch, opens on to old oak pews with shapely ends. The chancery paving, rails and carved stalls representing the life of Gregory the Great were given to the church in 1901 by the Luttrel family who lived in Badgworth Court. The beautiful carved stalls were the work of 2 Pinwill sisters, who had a woodcarving studio in Devon. Also not many of us know that the comedian Frankie Howerd and his partner Dennis Heymer are both buried in the churchyard.

Our final visit was to the church of St. Mary the Virgin in Christon. This small and simple example of Norman architecture has stood here for 900 hundred years. The church has a three bay nave with a south facing porch and chancel, the short two-stage tower is central and contains 2 bells one dated 1638, the other one is considerably earlier and bears the inscription ING. NAZARENVS REX IUDEORUM (Jesus of Nazareth, King of the Jews). There are 3 stain glass windows from Joseph Bell studio Bristol, the west window of the nave depicts Faith, Hope and Charity as shown by the emblems held by the figures. In the opposite north wall is a post-war memorial window depicting sergeant Durrant, a bomber navigator who was killed in a raid on the Kiel canal. He is shown in full kit with a map of the German port below. In the east window is a memorial to the Reverend Sepitmas Pope dated 1878. In the south wall there is a window of Medieval Somerset glass. The eagle and book depicted there, is the emblem of St. John the Baptist. The picture below is Keith and Paula enjoying the sun at Christon.
