By the time that they left around 300 people had gathered. Word had gone around the estate like wildfire. The dresses Pam & Nikki wore during the filming are in the Beatles Museum.

That December my sister, her husband and Nicola were invited to a fancy dress party at the Royal Lancaster Hotel in London for the first showing

of the film. Robert Morley was Father Christmas. Lulu took a shine to Nicola, looking after her during the party. They all sat on the floor to watch the film. Nikki sat between Lulu and John. My brother in law sat next to John and George. He later wrote an article for Q Magazine.

For the 50th Beatles anniversary, a film was supposed to be made using the people on the coach. They paid Nikki £1000 plus all expenses to come over from America (where she lives) to be interviewed. I don't think the film was ever made?

Governmentium

A new Element has been added to the Periodic Table, researchers at Melbourne University discovered this heaviest element yet known to science. This new element is

Governmentium (symbol Gv) has 1 neutron, 25 assistant neutrons, 88 deputy neutrons and 198 assistant deputy neutrons, giving it an atomic

mass of 312. These particles are held together by forces called morons, these are surrounded by vast quantities of leptonlike particles called pillocks. Since Governmentium has no electrons, it is inert. However, it can be detected, because it impedes every reaction with which it comes into contact.


This hypothetical quantity is referred to as a critical morass.

'On The Slate'

It was June 2019, a week holidaying in North Wales when it literally rained every day, not that the weather spoilt the holiday or the glorious scenery in that part of the world.

We visited as many places as we could, dressed in our wet gear and carrying umbrellas.

It was there that I bought a piece of genuine Welsh slate, cut and dressed

to form a place mat for the dining room table, it was exactly what I wanted for a project that I had had in mind for a very long time.

I have always had, in my head, a piece of poetry which I remembered from my childhood. My Mum had it. It was written on a wooden plaque and hung in our 'front room' as it was called in those days. A room which was used only at Christmas time or on special occasions.

As you can see from the picture, the wording relates to the garden, and my love of horticulture almost certainly

stems from my family genes. My Granddad (a market gardener) along with my Mother who could always be found in the garden once her chores were done.

So, seeing this piece of slate, my mind went into overdrive and I knew immediately exactly what I wanted to create.



I found the right script that I wanted to use on my laptop (as I am not adept enough to be able to produce it freehand). I then sellotaped the page to the slate, and using the page as a template after cutting out the centres of each letter, I then scratched each letter outline onto the slate using a scalpel.

This took many weeks and an awful lot of scalpel blades, but eventually I had the outline of the letters 'scratched' onto the surface of the slate.

The next thing to do was to very carefully paint in the letters using an enamel paint and a fine brush. This took many more weeks using a very steady hand, realising not long after I had started this part of the project, that I couldn't do it while sipping my glass of wine (which is probably why it took me so long!!)

Once all the wording had been painted in, I realised that it needed further enhancement to finish off my masterpiece. It seemed to lack that final touch.

I felt I needed to bring some aspect of working in the garden into it, something like everyday working tools.. Not being much of an artist myself, I was lucky that I knew someone who could and would help me and who lived not far away.

So I then took the plaque off to have a word with my sister Sheila. She kindly painted on all the sketches to give it that final touch. She made a perfect job of it as I knew she would, giving it a real garden feeling.

Now that it is finished, I have to say that I am very pleased with the way it has turned out, ending up just how I envisaged it at the start of it all.

All I need to do now, is to work out where, in the garden, I should place it.

Stained Glass Work

A hobby I started a couple of years ago and which has kept me busy during both “Lockdowns” is the art of stained glass work.

There are two main methods for assembling these pictures, one is using lead strips to separate each piece of glass (usually for the larger, heavier designs – church windows for example)) or, as these pictures show, the edges of each piece of glass is covered with copper foil and then soldered together, (known as copper foiling).



The main criteria is to cut the glass accurately in order that all the pieces fit snugly together, glass is not very forgiving, so accuracy at this stage is paramount. This can only come from practice and then even more practice.

Soldering is an art form in itself, it looks easy when you see other people do it, but I still find it a bit tricky, again, it’s just practice, but I’m getting there slowly.



I belong to a U3A stained glass group in Cheddar, where we used to meet up each week for tuition, sadly this has not happened for several months.

It is not a cheap hobby, the average cost of a single sheet of glass measuring approx 12" x 6" is around £10, so wastage is something to be considered when deciding where to cut it.

The second most expensive item for stained glass work are the packets of plasters for the cut fingers!!





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
