Winter Strolls 2023

The first Friday of the year and our numbers, usually small on a skittles day, were increased by the welcome return of Rod and Audrey, (thanks to Audrey for taking the photos) Barry (who had a free Friday) and Hugh (recovered from his stay in hospital) together with the hardy regulars made a group of eight.

The second walk of the year. The preceding week had been frosty and Friday was no exception. We arrived in Pawlett car park and decided that a stroll down River Road would be less slippery than up over the hill as the slope is south facing and glorious sunshine was making its presence felt. All of us made it safely to the river, where I stopped, the rest of the group set off along the bank towards Dunball. We were all surprised at how low the river was considering the water is being pumped off the moors at Northgate. A quick call, by Denise from the carpark to the Orchard Inn, organised lunch.

I missed the next walk, along the beach.

We parked in the playing field car park and set off along Locks Way. After a short distance we came across a cast iron, blue painted way marker that we had not seen there before. We were puzzled but it was a perfect photo opportunity! Fur-



ther along some SusTrans volunteers were clearing scrub and they told us there were a thousand of these erected on the National Cycle Route for the Millennium but that one had been stolen. A while ago they learned where it was and recovered it. Research when I came home showed that there are four different designs by four artists, one from each of the four UK nations. The Locks Way one is by Welsh artist Andrew Rowe. I turned back shortly after this but the others went on the Bawdrip, looked around the church, which fortunately was open, and returned via the footpath. We came back to the Watchfield Inn for lunch. The food was good, the staff friendly and helpful but when we went to pay the landlord was grumpy about us wanting to pay individually and about paying by card.

A typical grey February day but it was dry with gentle breeze when we arrived at Brean Down. The tide was going out but still made the whole scene attractive. We set off and as usual we split at the bottom of the old service road with Brenda, Bernie and Fay walking along the base where it is flat and the rest going up the road to walk towards the fort. After Audrey had taken the photo of those who made it to

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the top, I left them to continue their walk and came down the steps. We all met up again by the café where some of us had a snack and others went into Burnham for refreshment.

Churches 22

Our last walk of 2022 was to the Parish of the Three Saints. St. Mary the Virgin at East Brent being the first. It's stone spire, seen for miles, rises from a tower sculptured with three groups one above the other, of God the Father, Our Lord, and the Madonna. Indoors it is the ceiling and the medieval glass which draws all eyes. In one window are pictures of the Betrayal, the Judgment, and the Scourging, all from the 14th century. Three golden figures in the North Windows are thought to be medieval German. The ceiling is a rare one of embossed plaster with huge pendants; it's crown-of-thorns design picked out in a brown colour in 1637AD. Glass, plaster, ironwork and carving are fine examples of them all. For woodcarving there are lines of 15th century bench-ends, a fine Jacobean pulpit, a bold eagle with gilded wings, and a Jacobean gallery.

The arms of Glastonbury and the winged beasts of the Evangelists are on the bench ends; some say they came from the Abbey at Glastonbury. Two stone priests of the 14th century lie in the church, while a layman, probably one of their congregation, lies outside in the grass.

Parts of the building date from 1298AD. The tower and spire were added around 1400AD. It contains a ring of six bells cast between 1450AD and 1910AD.

We went on to visit the church of St. John the Baptist at Biddisham. The original construction in the 13th century was on the site of an earlier church; parts of the church were rebuilt in the 15th century. It underwent extensive Victorian restoration around 1860AD. The font (the only remains of an earlier church) is Norman. The wooden pulpit is an interesting example of Jacobean craftsmanship, and is similar to that at Weare, which is dated 1617AD. The beautiful windows are 15th century and the South doorway is 16th century.

Outside the remains of the Medieval Scratch dial (the early time piece) can be seen opposite the South wall buttress. The tower contains 4 bells cast in 1609AD and 1628AD by the foundry of Richard Purdue.

Onto the"Historic Church of Weare".

Although most of the existing church building was built in the 15th century, the history of this church goes back to the 11th century. Perhaps the oldest piece in the Church of St. Gregory is the font which dates back to 1150AD. This beautiful church is home to a number of artistic pieces from various time periods, some of these include a Jacobean pulpit and carved choir stalls depicting the life of St. Gregory in Weare; it's a lovely place to visit. You may also like to know the late comedian Frankie Howerd is buried there.

We ended our tour with lunch break at Ollie's café, a lovely meal enjoyed by all.

Our next church visit will be on the 29th April.

Churches 22 Part 2

There is a stuffed owl which sits in a alcove, gazing out towards the congregation in the church at Weare.

Of the twelve of us "Strollers" who visited this place on one of Bernard's church trips recently, not one of us could offer up any ideas of exactly why it was there! On investigation, I happened upon the following explanation. The owl, who was never given a name, lived for many years in the church before its demise (the owl that is, not the church). Rumour has it, that the late Frankie Howerd who lived not far from Weare in the village of Cross, and is buried in the graveyard at Weare, used to visit the church on a regular basis and talk to the owl. It is also rumoured that the owl became his audience while Frankie rehearsed his lines for whatever show or film that he was about to star in.

Sadly, on one visit to St. Gregory's church some forty years ago, Frankie was informed that the owl has sadly passed away. This affected him greatly, so much so, that he decided to get the owl stuffed and put back into the alcove so that he could continue using him as his audience while reciting his 'up and coming' lines. This he subsequently did, and the owl remains there to this day. Frankie was buried in 1992, and it was decided the owl should remain where it was as a memorial to this great comedian.

All this happened thirty years ago now, and trying to confirm this story using the internet, and searching both the church's and Frankie Howerd's Wikipedia forums, I am at a loss to find any reference at all to the above story.

What is true however (that's not to say the above is not true), is that bats are extremely afraid of owls, who are their natural enemies and by placing a stuffed or plastic owl somewhere close to the bat's roosting place, then this will deter them. This is the theory, but it would appear that this does not work in this church. Maybe someone needs to move the owl to a different location within the church or maybe look for an alternative comedian to keep the rumour alive...... **Story By Barry Ede**
