
Chairman's Message

St. Mary's Church Westonzoyland

The date of the first building on the site of St. Mary's church is not known, but there was certainly a chapel there in 1268 when the Abbot of Glastonbury agreed to repair and maintain its chancel. The effigy of the priest in the north transept, dated to about 1300, is the oldest recognisable part of the fabric.

The current church seems to be a rebuilding of the late 15th century and early 16th century, both because of its style and because of initials RB for Richard Bere Abbot of Glastonbury 1493-1524. There is a bench end still in regular use clearly carved with the initials RB.

The church of St. Mary's was surrounded by the events of 6th July 1685 when the Battle of Sedgemoor was enacted, reputedly the last significant battle on English soil.

Major improvements to the fabric of the church were made in the 17th and mid 18th centuries. The tower was partially restored in 1907; it contains 6 bells the oldest being medieval from the foundry of Thomas Jeffries of Bristol, two others are from the 18th century by Thomas Wroth and Thomas Bayley of Bridgwater. The sixth bell was added in 1934 when the bells were re-hung.

Features to be seen in the church:

The church is notable for the exceptional height of its splendid tower which is typical of the Somerset perpendicular style. The tower, along with the whole south front of the church is richly decorated in Ham Stone.

The nave roof is described as the most elaborate of its tie-beam type in the country.

The font is from the 14th century.

The chancel is enclosed by a rood screen installed in the 1930s.

In the 1980s, visited by a growing number of travellers, the church ministers were far more than just parishioners. Once itself a prison for those who fought for a cause in which they passionately believed, it is now a place of prayer for those who seek to bring an end to fighting.

St. Mary the Virgin Chedzoy

The Anglican church of St. Mary's dates from around the 13th century. There is evidence of a church on Chedzoy in 1166. When it was given along with the parent church in North Petherton to Buckland Priory Somerset, is was once the property of the Order of St. John of Jerusalem at Mynchin Buckland.

Much of the building is from the 17th century although the Norman Chancel arch and doorway remain.

Throughout its long history of over 700 years, Chedzoy church has had many patrons including King Henry VII, King Henry VIII and the Earls of Salisbury and Pembroke.

The brass memorial on the floor by the South entrance depicts Sir Richard Sydenham of Chedzoy, wearing armour of the 15th century. He left a piece of land to the church to be sold by auction every 21 years. The auction takes place while a half inch of a candle burns and the last bid before the flame dies is the successful one.

During the English Civil War, Lord Fairfax made Chedzoy his head-

quarters during the siege of Bridgwater in 1645. Six regiments of the Parlimentary army encamped at Chedzoy.

The most famous event in the church's history was the Battle of Sedgemoor on the 6th July 1685 when the Duke of Monmouth led the 'Pichfork Rebellion' on a midnight raid on the Royal Army at Westonzoyland. The Duke an illegitmate son of Charles II was attempting to sieze the throne of England after the death of his father. Local tradition says that the church still bears marks from the forces who sharpened their swords before the battle.

St. Michael and all Angels Bawdrip

The parish of Bawdrip was formed long before the present parish church was built. The Doomsday Book of 1086 records the settlements of Bawdrip and Bradney as being owned by the great landowner Walter de Douai. For several centuries his descendants, the Lovells of Castle Cary, were the feudal overlords.

The Anglican church was built in the late 13th or early 14th century on the site or an early church which belong to Athelney Abbey. It underwent much Victorian restoration in 1866 and is now a grade 2 listed building. The parish is part of the beniface of Woolavington with Cossington and Bawdrip which is part of the Diocese of Bath and Wells.

The church was built of Blue Lias stone and consists of a two-bay nave, chancel, and north and south transepts and within the crossing tower are 4 bells, two of these are believed to be from 1448 and the others from 1671 and 1745. In the North Aisle is an effigy of Sir Simon de Bradney under a large gothic arch; between his hands is a heart carved in stone indicating that only his heart is buried there. It

was common practice for knights who held land in more than one

parish to have the heart buried in one and the body in another.

A very interesting church.
