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

St. Michael's Church, Enmore



Many churches built upon hills overlooking the sea, and on rocky islands and not far from the mainland are dedicated to St. Michael.

The date of the earliest Church built upon such a lovely site, overlooking the Severn sea, is unknown, but one can well believe that such a site on the eastern edge of the Quantock forest, in full view of the rising sun, was a consecrated spot even before the earliest church was built thereon. We assume that there was an early Saxon Church built upon an already sanctified spot.

After the Norman Conquest the Manorial Rights of Enmore were given to William Malet, the friend of the Conqueror, in about 1100AD. This notable family lived at Enmore from 1100AD until 1681AD, when the property passed into the hands of the Earl of Egmont. He lived at Enmore Castle, and held the Manorial and Park lands until 1838AD.

Somewhere between 1100AD and 1135AD the Norman Church was built, of which the beautiful South Doorway with its late Norman dog tooth moulding is all that remains.

Early in the 15th Century, to the old church was added the beautiful

tower, the top of which commands extensive views of the Severn Sea. In the year 1873AD, with generous assistance of Thomas Palfrey Broadmead, of Enmore Castle, and others, the church was thoroughly restored and the North Transept added, with space for the Organ Chamber and Vestry, at a cost of £2,000.

Previous to 1887AD there was in the tower a ring of five bells, the inscription on the new treble telling its own story: "Thomas Palfrey Broadmead gave me AD1897 in the 60th Year of the reign of Queen Victoria". The other four bells are dated 1647, 1734, 1796(x2) and 1823.

In 1979AD the statue of St. Michael was given to the Church by the family of Rev'd Robert James, Rector of Goathurst and Enmore.

Our second visit was to the church of St. Margaret at Spaxton



The church of St. Margaret in Spaxton has some parts from the 12th and 13th Centuries but is predominantly from the 15th Century.

There was probably a wooden church on the site before the Norman Conquest though nothing is mentioned in the Doomsday Book. The first stone church was probably just a nave and chancel, much of this building has been replaced. The present three-bay nave has a south aisle and includes Norman Stonework. The church tower was built around 1434AD from a will bequeathing money for its con-

struction; it contains six bells, two of which date from the late 17th

Century.

As you enter the church there is a bust above the door; this is a representation of our patron saint, St. Margaret of Antioch. All medieval churches were dedicated to a particular saint or divine person, and for the most part the Church of England has maintained this tradition.

Spaxton church was not always dedicated to St. Margaret. As late as 1742 this was known as St. Mary's Church and we don't really know why this dedication was changed.
